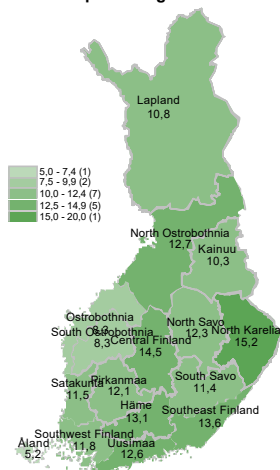

Unemployment continued to increase in June

Unemployed jobseekers' percentage of the workforce by ELY centre



At the end of June, a total of 330,800 unemployed jobseekers were registered with municipal employment services. This is 37,500 more than a year earlier. The number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 23,400 from the previous month. Unemployed jobseekers accounted for 12.2 per cent of the labour force, which is 1.3 percentage points more than in June last year. The figures are from the Employment Service Statistics of the Development and Administrative Services Centre (KEHA Centre).

Due to the implementation of a new national customer information system, there have been disruptions in the transfer of data related to certain services. The problems particularly affect labour market training, job search training and career coaching, and possibly also work and training trials, for which the figures for June may be too low.

Starting on 1 March 2025, the Development and Administrative Services Centre (KEHA Centre) has been responsible for the Employment Service Statistics.

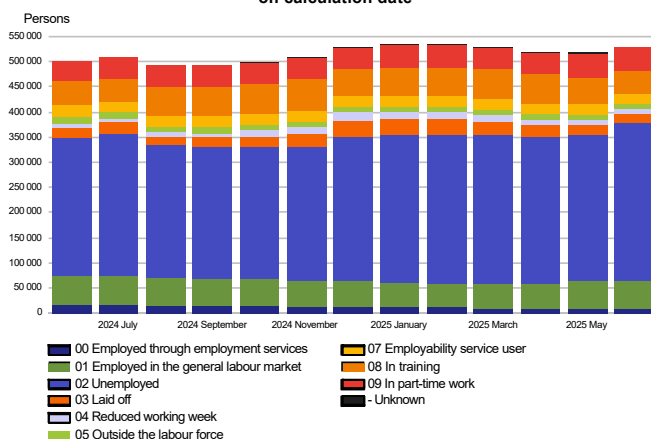
Trends:

- The total number of all jobseekers increased by 25,800 compared with the previous year
- The number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 37,500 from the previous year
- The number of people fully laid off decreased by 2,400 from the previous year
- Services included in the activation rate had 24,700 fewer participants than a year ago
- The number of new job vacancies increased by 7,300 from the previous year

The total number of jobseekers increased while the number of lay-offs decreased

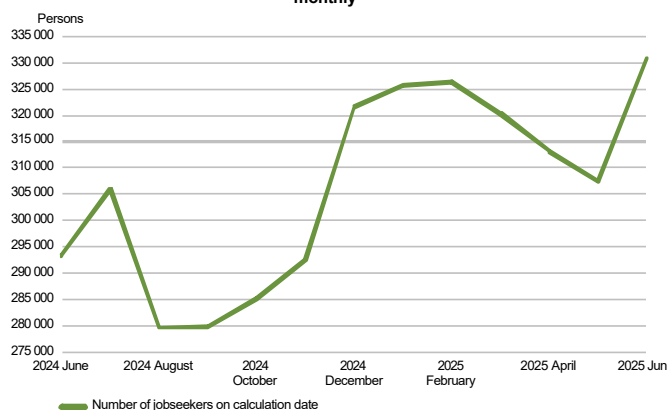
At the end of June, the number of jobseekers registered with municipal employment services totalled 529,500, an increase of 25,800 from the previous year. Of the jobseekers, 275,500 were men and 253,800 were women. Compared with the situation a year ago, the number of men increased by 12,500 and the number of women increased by 13,200.

Of the jobseekers, 111,500 were employed: 56,300 in full-time employment, 46,500 in part-time employment and 8,700 through employment services. The number of jobseekers outside the labour force was 77,300, of whom 18,500 were in services promoting employment and 47,600 in training. Of the jobseekers, 330,800 were unemployed, an increase of 37,500 from the previous year. In June, 17,400 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 800 less than in May. Compared with June the previous year, the number of people fully laid off decreased by 2,400. Furthermore, jobseekers on a reduced working week numbered 9,900, representing an increase of 1,200 on the year before.

monthly

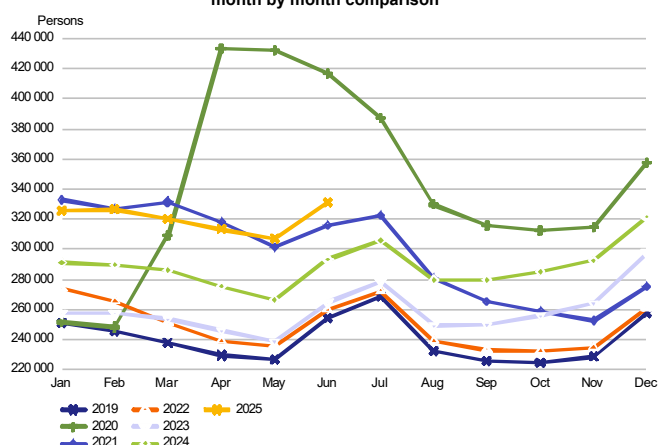


The number of unemployed jobseekers increased

At the end of June, the number of unemployed jobseekers registered with municipal employment services totalled 330,800, an increase of 37,500 from the previous year. Compared with May, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 23,400. The number of new job searches among unemployed jobseekers totalled 20,400 in June, down 300 from the previous year. In total, 50,600 unemployment periods began in June, which is a decrease of 11,000 from last year. The number of new periods of unemployment increased by 14,000 from May. The number of new periods is always greater than the number of job searches, because new unemployment periods are also started by existing groups of jobseekers.

The number of foreign citizens among unemployed jobseekers totalled 52,400, an increase of 5,700 from June last year. Of the foreign unemployed jobseekers, EU/EEA citizens accounted for 11,400 at the end of June, an increase of 900 compared to the previous year.

month by month comparison

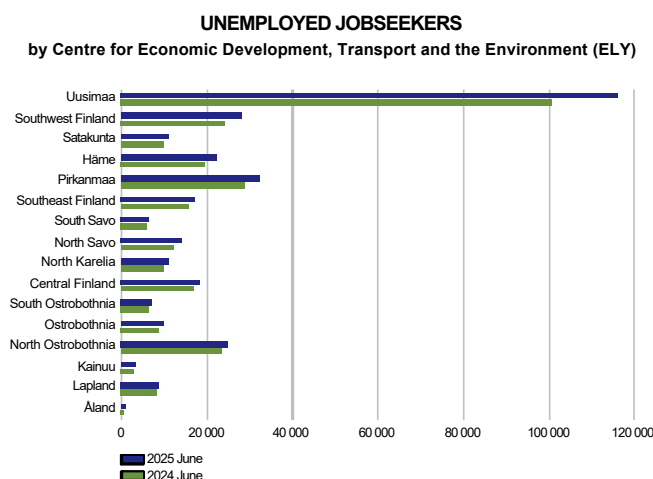


The number of full-time lay-offs continued to decline

In June, 17,400 of unemployed jobseekers were fully laid off, which is 800 fewer than in May. Compared with June the previous year, the number of people fully laid off decreased by 2,400. In June, the number of new job searches among those fully laid off totalled 1,700, representing a decrease of 200 from the previous year. The number of new full layoff periods was 7,000, down 1,100 from June the previous year. The number of new full layoff periods increased by 1,800 from May.

The number of people fully laid off decreased in seven groups, increased in two groups and remained the same in one professional group when compared with the previous year. Compared to last year, the number of people fully laid off decreased the most among those with the groups of 'unknown' (-1,800), craft and related trades workers (-400), professionals (-200) and clerical workers (-100). The number of people laid off increased in the occupational groups of managers (200) and service and sales workers (200).

Unemployment increased again in all ELY Centre regions

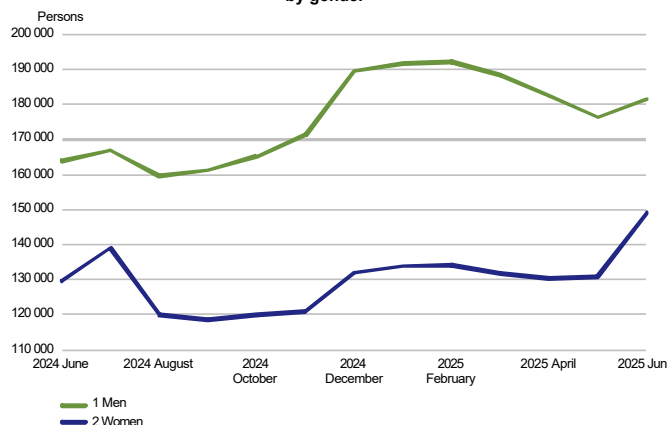
In June, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased compared to the same period last year in all ELY Centre regions. The largest increases occurred in Southwest Finland (16%), Uusimaa (16%), North Savo (15%) and Häme (15%). In Åland, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 22 per cent. Compared with May, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased in each ELY Centre region. Compared with the previous month, unemployment grew the most in Ostrobothnia (17%), Central Finland (10%), Southwest Finland (9%), North Karelia (9%), Pirkanmaa (9%) and North Ostrobothnia (9%). In Åland, the number of unemployed jobseekers increased by 5% from May.

Unemployed jobseekers by gender and age-group

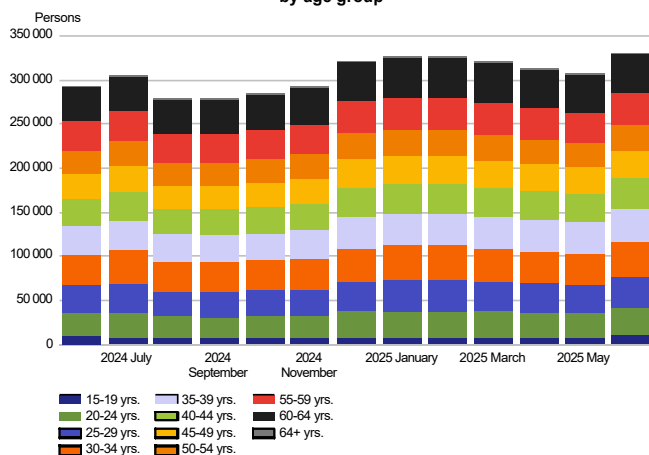
**UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

Unemployment increased among women more than among men

In June, 181,600 (55%) unemployed jobseekers were men and 149,100 (45%) were women. Since May, unemployment among men increased by 5,200 and among women by 18,200. Compared with June the previous year, unemployment among men increased by 17,800 (11%) and among women by 19,500 (15%).

by age group**



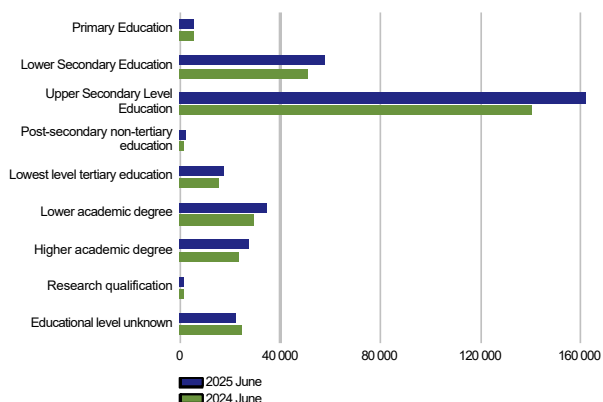
Youth unemployment increased notably from the previous month, while unemployment among those over 64 years of age increased the most from the previous year

At the end of June, the number of unemployed jobseekers under 25 years of age was 42,000, representing an increase of 6,200 from June the previous year. Youth unemployment increased by 6,800 from May. A total of 10,900 people under the age of 20 were unemployed. The number of unemployed persons aged over 50 was 110,500, showing an increase of 10,700 on the year before. The number of unemployed aged over 55 was 81,100, which is 8,000 more than the year before. Unemployment increased in all age groups compared with the previous year. The largest increases occurred among those over 64 years of age (24%), under 20 years of age (20%) and between 20 and 24 years of age (16%). Compared with May, unemployment increased in all age groups; the most among those under 20 years of age (46%), those between 20 and 24 years of age (12%) and those between 25 and 29 years of age (9%).



Unemployed jobseekers by levels of education and occupational group

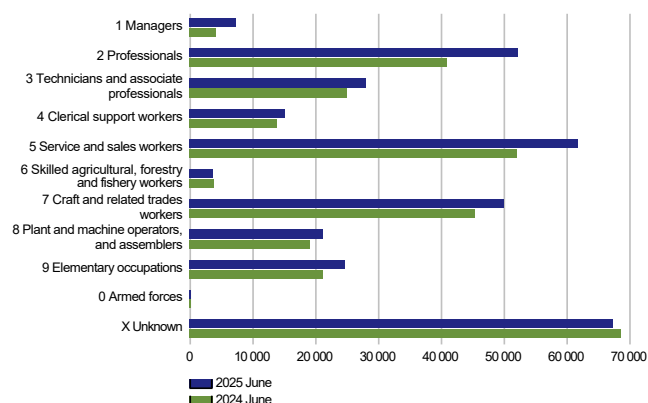
**UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

Unemployment continued to increase across all levels of education

Unemployment by level of education compared with June the previous year increased on all levels of education. The number of unemployed jobseekers whose level of education was unknown decreased in June by 10% from the previous year. Unemployment increased the most among jobseekers with a special vocational education (26%), bachelor's or equivalent level degree (18%) and master's or equivalent level degree (17%).

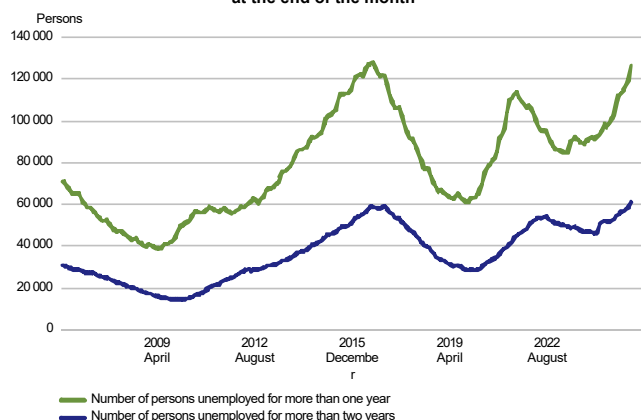
**UNEMPLOYED JOBSEEKERS

Unemployment increased in almost all occupational groups – the largest increase in terms of numbers occurred among professionals

By occupational group, unemployment increased in all groups except for skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers (-2%) and in the groups of 'unknown' (-2%). In relative terms, unemployment increased the most among managers (77%). In terms of numbers, unemployment increased the most among professionals (11,300), service and sales workers (10,000), craft and related trades workers (4,400), elementary occupations (3,500) and technicians and associate professionals (3,100).

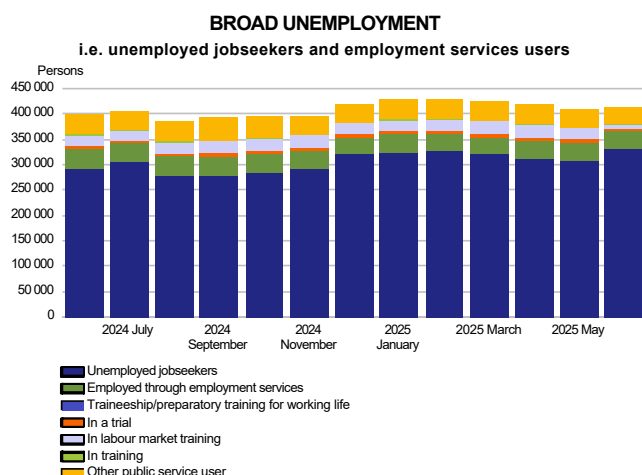
**LONG-TERM UNEMPLOYED

Long-term unemployment continued to increase

At the end of June, the number of long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than a year amounted to 126,100, up 30,800 on the previous year. Of the long-term unemployed, 74,500 were men and 51,600 were women. The number of men increased by 17,700 (31%) from the previous year and the number of women by 13,100 (34%). Long-term unemployed who had been unemployed without interruption for more than two years numbered 61,100, which is 9,700 more than a year ago.

Services

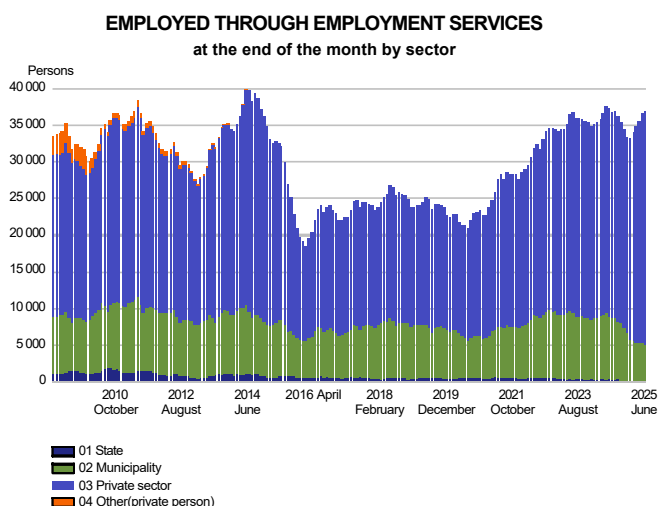


The number of service users continued to decline

At the end of June, the number of persons covered by services included in the activation rate amounted to 81,000, down 24,700 from the previous year. At the end of June, the activation rate was 19,7 per cent, which is 6.8 percentage points lower than a year earlier. In all, 2.7 per cent of the labour force were covered by the services included in the activation rate.

Of those covered by services, the number of men was 40,700, down 12,400 from the previous year. The number of women covered by these services was 40,400, down 12,300 from the previous year.

Broad unemployment, or the total number of unemployed jobseekers and those covered by services, was 411,900 at the end of June. This is 12,800 more than in June last year.



Growth in the number of people employed in the private sector continued

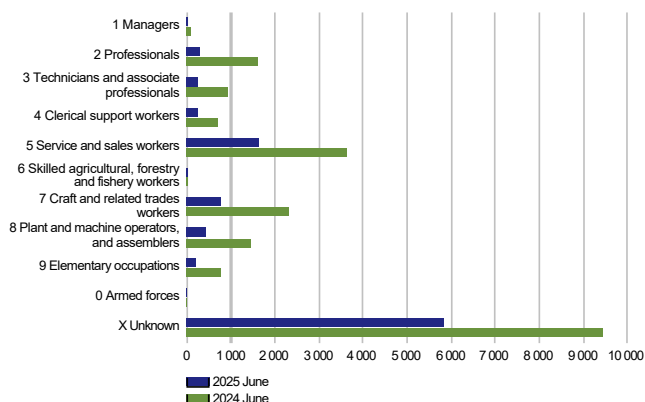
At the end of June, the number of persons claiming pay subsidies or receiving startup grants totalled 37,000, which is 500 fewer than the year before. Of those in placements, 13 per cent were employed by municipalities and 87 per cent by the private sector. Since June the previous year, the number of placements had increased by 12 per cent in the private sector but decreased by 43 per cent in municipalities. Of those in placements, 53 per cent were men. Placements decreased by 800 for men and increased by 300 from the previous year for women.

Placements in the central government are no longer included in the June figures. Placements in the central government ended at the end of 2024.

in target profession at the end of the month



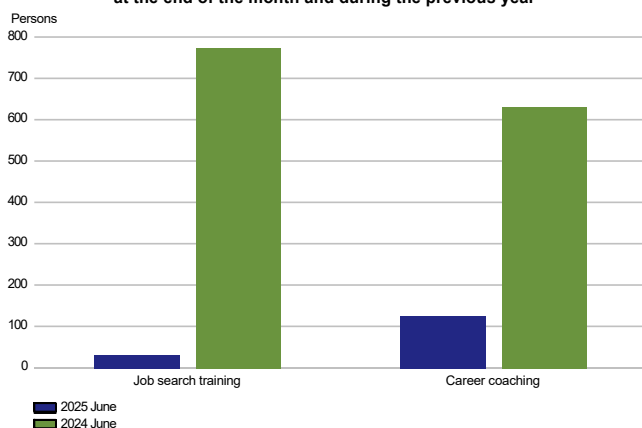
The number of participants in labour market training continued to decline

At the end of June, 9,700 people participated in labour market training, down 11,300 from the previous year. Of those participating in labour market training, 4,300 were men and 5,400 were women. The number of men decreased by 5,100 and the number of women by 6,100 from June the previous year. In June, 1,900 new participants started labour market training, which is 700 more than a year earlier.

Of those participating in labour market training, the largest group in June was those without a profession (4,100). The group size increased by 4,000 from the previous year.

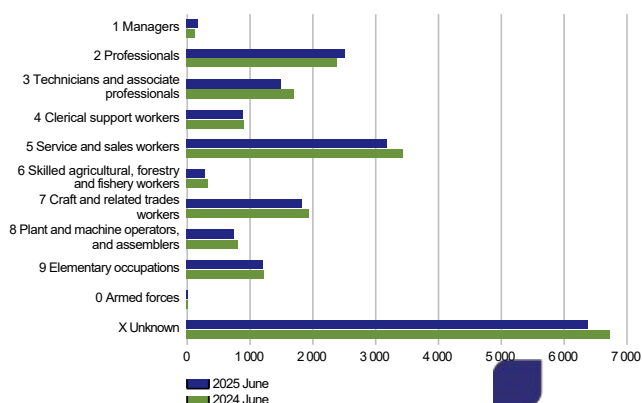
IN TRAINING

The number of persons in job search training and career coaching decreased

At the end of June, the number of persons participating in career coaching and job search training was 200, which is 1,200 fewer than in June last year.

in person's profession at the end of the month



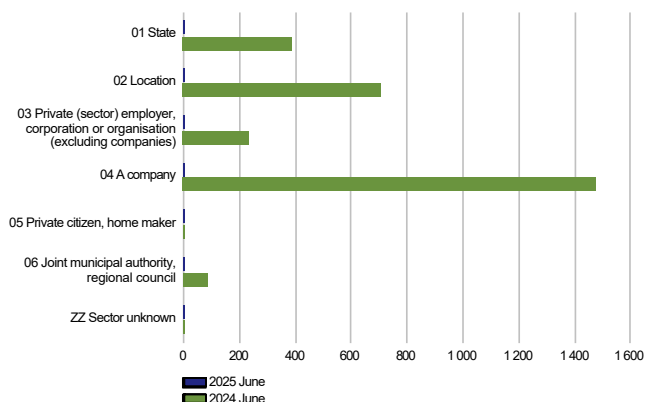
Fewer people in self-motivated studies than in the previous year

A total of 18,700 people studied with an unemployment benefit in self-motivated studies, representing a decrease of 900 from the previous year. 7,600 men were studying while receiving unemployment benefits, which is 200 fewer than the previous year. The corresponding number for women was 11,000, representing an increase of 700 from the previous year.

Of those studying in self-motivated studies, the largest group consisted of people without a profession (6,300). The size of the group increased by 100 compared with the previous year.

Job alternation, rehabilitative work and trials

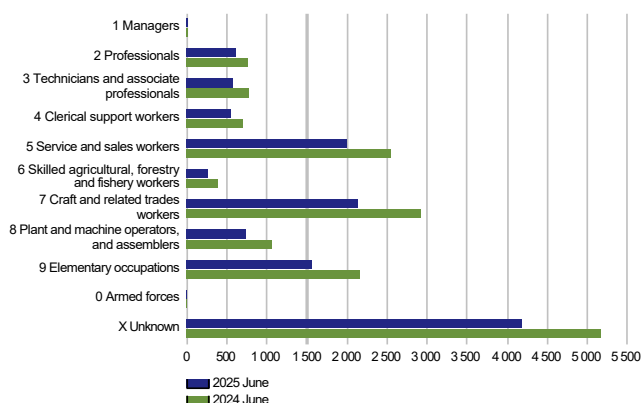
AS A JOB ALTERNATION SUBSTITUTE

The use of job alternation substitutes ended

In March, the number of job alternation substitutes reached zero. In June the previous year, there were still 3,200 job alternation substitutes.

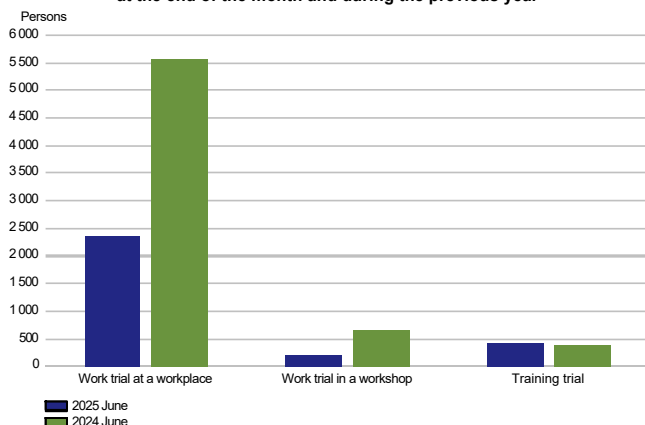
REHABILITATIVE WORK ACTIVITIES

Participation in rehabilitative work activities decreased

At the end of June, the number of persons in rehabilitative work activities was 12,600, down 3,900 from the previous year. Of the participants, 7,200 were men and 5,400 were women. The number of men decreased by 2,300 and the number of women by 1,600 from the previous year.

at the end of the month and during the previous year



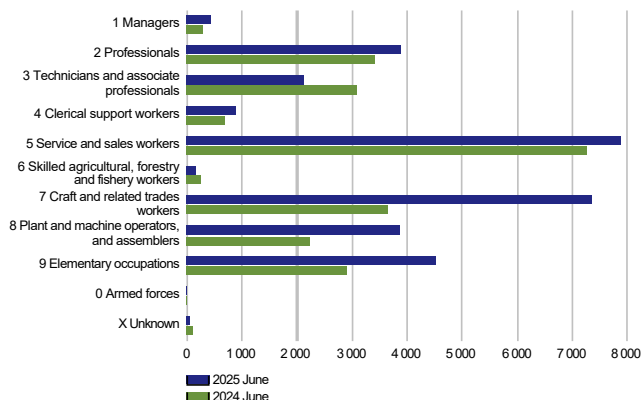
Participation in work and training try-outs continued to decline

Work and training try-outs had a total of 3,000 participants at the end of June, which is 3,600 fewer than in June last year. Of the participants, 1,600 were men and 1,300 were women. The number of men taking part in try-outs decreased by 2,000 and the number of women by 1,600 from the previous year.

The number of new vacancies grew in June

The number of new vacancies posted to Job Market Finland during June totalled 31,100, which is 7,300 more than in June the previous year. In all, the number of unfilled vacancies in June was 71,300, which is 11,100 more than a year ago. The number of vacancies remaining unfilled at Job Market Finland at the end of June was 40,700, up 15,100 from the previous year.

Information on the number cancelled vacancies is not available as of June 2025. There were 19,000 cancelled vacancies in May 2025 and 16,600 in June 2024.

The number of new vacancies increased in seven groups, decreased in two groups and remained the same in one occupational group compared with last year. The greatest increase in the number of vacancies was recorded among craft and related trades workers (+3,700), plant and machine operators and assemblers (+1,600), elementary occupations (+1,600), service and sales workers (+600) and professionals (+500). Job vacancies for technicians and associate professionals decreased the most (-1000).

Information about the website

On this website you will find the latest statistics from the Development and Administrative Services Centre's (KEHA Centre) monthly Employment Bulletin. You can access a .pdf version of the current and previous months' Employment Bulletin by following the link on the right.

The Employment Bulletin is based on the data from the Employment Service Statistics. The Development and Administrative Services Centre (KEHA Centre) compiles statistics on the clients of the Employment authorities, including registered job-seekers, labour market policy services, and job vacancies. The data is collected from the customer service registries used by the Employment authorities. This means that the data used by Employment Service Statistics is completely registry-based.

The statistical data covers all persons, services, and open vacancies in the above mentioned groups, as separately defined in the registry by the classifications and variables for the statistical period in question.

Owing to seasonal variations, the Employment Bulletin always includes a comparison with the corresponding month in the previous year. The descriptors used in the Bulletin are also available in a table format. The Employment Bulletins are published at the end of the subsequent calendar month. The official date of publication is announced in advance.
